Sandra Alland is a feminist writer and performer living in Toronto. She has been published in *The Lazy Writer, ink magazine,* and *Zygote*. When not writing (or working to pay off her student loans), she enjoys playing in her garden and eating avocados. She is thrilled to be published in *Tessera*.

Lynne Bell is head of the Department of Art and Art History at the University of Saskatchewan. She has published interviews with contemporary artists in *Third Text, West Coast Line, BC Studies, Canadian Woman Studies,* and the *Capilano Review*. Her most recent curatorial project was the exhibition and publication (ed), *Urban Fictions* (Presentation Gallery, Vancouver, 1996).
