Notes on Contributors/Collaboratrices

Paola Bono teaches English language and literature at the University of Rome, "La Sapienza." She is on the editorial board of *DonnaWomanFemme* and has recently edited for Blackwell (with Sandra Kemp) *Italian Feminist Thought: A Reader.* She is currently working on a book on Dido.

Roz Currier, a teacher, director, actor, believes that theory must combine with practise to create feminist theatre. Currently she is doing research on women characters and actresses in 16th century Italian *Commedia dell'arte* at the Graduate Centre for the Study of Drama, University of Toronto.

Dena Davida was born in French Hospital, New York City, April 3, 1949. Her profession is the movement arts. She is at once a creator, performer, teacher, artistic director of the Tangente dance space, writer, researcher and dance community organizer. She has recently published an essay on dance and culture, "Dancing the Body Eclectic" in the *Vendredi du Corps* anthology (Fall 1991). Her last coast-to-coast Canadian tour in the parallel galleries was the inter-media performance work, "Pièce de Résistance: un exposé de la femme musclée," and in September 1991 she created "déCORPStiqué: la sensualité codifée" for a performance art festival at the Musée de Québec.

Susan Hawthorne has worked in publishing for many years developing lists in fiction, poetry, and non-fiction. She is co-founder, with Renate Klein, of Spinifex Press, an independent feminist press based in Melbourne, Australia. She writes fiction, poetry and non-fiction and her books include: Difference (1985), Moments of Desire (1989/90), The Exploding Frangipani (1990), Angels of Power (1991), and The Spinifex Book of Women's Answers (1991). Hystories, a collection of essays and stories, and her novel, The Falling Woman will be published in 1992: the sequence of poems, The Language in My Tongue will appear in 1993. Her poems have been published in magazines and anthologies in

Australia, UK, USA and Canada. In 1989 she received the Pandora Florence James Award for Outstanding Contribution to Women's Publishing.

Nicole Jolicoeur is an artist living and working in Montreal where she teaches at UQAM. Her works in different media have been exhibited in Canada and the U.S. They have also been published as *Charcot, deux concepts de nature* (1988) and *La verité folle* (1989).

Penn Kemp is "one of Canada's most vigorous and stimulating performance poets. Her work involves an interchange across the traditional boundaries of lyric, narrative and dramatic expression." Thanks to a senior Canada Council grant, she is writing a book of memoirs, "Bound by Body," exploring the precognitive representation of the female body in dream imagery.

Marion McMahon is a film-maker and part-time Ph. D. student at the Ontario Institute of Studies in Education in Toronto. She is currently co-organizing a conference on Women and Autobiography in the Academy (Spring 1992) and working on a film entitled *Racing Home*.

Dôre Michelut was born in Friuli, Italy and grew up in Canada and has studied in both countries. She has published *Loyalty to the Heart*, a collection of prose poetry (Guernica); *Ouroboros: the Book that Ate Me*, a cyclical rotation of 4 genres in 576 fragments that move toward a view of the self; and, in collaboration, a form adapted from the ancient

Japanese renga titled *Linked Alive* in the English and *Liens* in the simultaneous French Edition (Trois).

Sarah Murphy is a translator, interpreter, teacher, visual artist, social activist and author of two books of fiction, *Comic Book Heroine* (short fiction), and *The Measure of Miranda* (a novel). Her second novel, *Lilac Summer* is now finished. The "Paramilitary Parafictions" section of the work seen here will be appearing as footnotes in her new collection of fiction, to be published by Mercury Press in the fall of 1992.
